# **BLACKO BRING MACBETH TO LIFE**

All students from Blacko have been studying Macbeth as part of their English lessons. They have learnt about the history of Shakespeare including when and where he was born and some of the other plays he wrote. They produced a small film with their interpretation of some of the major scenes in the play, even visiting a woodland at the foot of Pendle Hill (Pendle being notorious for witchcraft) to re-create the setting for when Macbeth meets the three witches.

Everyone enjoyed taking part in the drama sessions and they took delight in putting their own stamp on the main scenes of the story. Much of the story of Macbeth is very dark; a story of murder, greed and ambition and the students got a real feel for this and found it somewhat easy to get into character. The famous dagger scene was played by Sulaman whose interpretation was very impromptu and memorable. He had to portray a mind in turmoil near insanity whose character was tarnished with greed and deception. Another stirring performance from the actors was the scene where the three witches prophesied what would happen to Macbeth. There was a even contemporary theme running through one of the acts where Layne created an unscripted live commentary during the murder of King Duncan.



# **OUR SCHOOL GAINS FOOD BANK AWARD**

Activities included discussions and scenarios. By the end of the sessions the students had an understanding of what is meant by safeguarding and why it is important. The students were able to say what they could do if they have a safeguarding issue or concern, and what happens next. Students were able to talk about their responsibilities in staying safe and keeping others safe. More sessions are planned for next term.
