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

#### **ERASMUS MALAGA TRIP**

In June, a group of students in Post 16 had the amazing chance to go to Malaga as part of the Erasmus Creating Inclusive Career Opportunities project. We are working with partners from Poland, Spain and Lithuania to create a documentary about employment opportunities for young people with learning disabilities.

The students met our partners, visiting some of the sights of the city including the Picasso museum, a castle and a park. We visited the school, tasting traditional food, playing football and having an open air disco in the beautiful sunshine. Students created a video of the different types of job roles they saw throughout the visit, including an interview with the hotel receptionist. All of the students were impeccably behaved, not one moan or groan as there was lots of walking, even when we clocked up 8 miles one day. They were all a credit to themselves, their families and our college, an absolute pleasure to be with.









## **VOLUNTEER IT YOURSELF**

This term, in post 16, there have been two projects run by "Volunteer It Yourself". This is an organisation that utilises a range of tradespeople to work alongside young people to pass on their skills and knowledge whilst working together on all kinds of community projects.

The first was an employability skills workshop for our year 14's, where students worked together over the morning to use team working skills, communication and listening skills to tackle a series of problem solving tasks.

The second workshop was a full day practical activity for some students in years 12, 13 and 14 building bench planters for our sensory garden. As always, our students were a credit to themselves and our college whilst working with new people from outside providers. They all worked tremendously hard, producing high quality work and created three bench planters by the end of the session.



#### SAILING

The majority of our pupils and staff experienced the feeling of having waves beneath their feet when they took part in our sailing sessions held at Lake Burwain in Foulridge. The sun shone, the wind blew, the rain drizzled, however the smiles still shone through. Everyone had an exciting time being transported across the rolling waves to undergo the challenges. Students were happy to experience being a member of the seafaring gentry.

There were some notable partnerships including Abdul and Farhan's exploits, Danielle captaining Ben Priestley and Jordan and Nicola caught 'in irons' moving backwards! All pupils took it in turn to either sail individually, with a partner or in small groups on the safety boats.

None of this would be possible without the volunteers who gave precious time to support the students and make them feel at ease. Also a massive thank you goes to the Fort Foundation whose sponsorship made the whole project possible. We hope this venture can continue and help our students engage in what might be a once in a lifetime experience.


































#### SENSORY GARDEN OPENING

Over the last year, we have been working hard to improve our sensory garden and make the space more inviting, stimulating and well used within school and college. The entire outdoor space has been completely revamped and has benefitted from many improvements. This includes new paving with split sections of different textured stones, cobbles and flags. A sensory footpath has been formed, containing different textures to walk on and feel with your feet such as sponge, sand, pebbles and bark. We have had a wall built with a raised garden bed and installed a picnic bench with wheelchair access. A teaching area has been created with benches and artificial grass. We have used various areas to link in with curriculum subjects i.e. using the circular cobbles for maths or playing on the musical panels within the pagoda. We have also had a polytunnel put up.

On Tuesday 2nd July we held a sensory garden open event so that we could share with our parents/carers and the wider community just how amazing our new garden looks. We had stalls selling various garden items made by the DT group, games such as higher or lower and tin can alley, pebble painting, book sales and homecooked food and cakes. The sun even made an appearance! The event was a huge success and we got great feedback from the people who attended. A big thank you goes to all involved.











## D.T. GROUP CREATE STORYTELLER CHAIR

As part of our recent sensory garden revamp project, students & staff were encouraged to come up with ways that the outdoor teaching area could be used more. One suggestion was a storytelling corner, where sensory stories could be brought to life in the outside air. Our D.T. group took this idea on board and began looking for ideas of items they could make in their lessons to help create this space. They researched lots of different outdoor ideas and came across lots of images of various outdoor storyteller chairs which were over sized and made entirely from wood. To buy, the chairs ranged in price upward of £850! Always ready to accept a new challenge, the D.T. group decided they could make their own, and it would be bigger and better than any they could buy!

Their first job was to source the materials. The students went for a walk to see if there were any natural materials they could collect and use. Luckily just at the right time, the trees surrounding the school had recently been pruned and the off cuts were available to take. They gathered up as many as they could and took them back to D.T. to start working on the chair. With help from staff, students worked hard over a few weeks to debark, cut to length, shape, sand and finish each piece of wood, ready for construction. Once each piece was ready, they began to put together the chair. This wasn't an easy task, and it took a lot of logical thinking and problem solving skills to ensure the chair was both practical and reliable. When the group were happy with the chair, they asked lots of different members of staff to test it out, some of whom were smaller than others, and quite a lot of people's feet couldn't touch the ground! The chair was perfect! All that was left to do, was to make it weather proof and then the chair was ready to go outside.

The chair now has pride of place in our teaching area in the sensory garden and is being used regularly while we have the nice weather. Classes have been enjoying a range of lessons and stories, all incorporating the chair. The D.T. group are very proud of their work! Well done to all involved.







## NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR PCHS&C



The Gatsby Benchmarks are a framework of 8 guidelines that define the best careers provision in schools and colleges. The national careers strategy is built around them, becoming new Statutory Guidance for careers in January 2018 to be fully embedded by 2020. The Gatsby Benchmarks originated in a research report (Good Career Guidance) from the Gatsby Foundation in 2013.

The report was commissioned by Lord Sainsbury and Sir John Holman was appointed to lead a research team to focus on international evidence for 'what works' in career development. Since January last year, we have been working as a school and college on the 8 Gatsby Benchmarks.

Jenny Bayliss, Deputy Headteacher, has worked with Enterprise coordinator Penny Heys and Andrea Huggett, PSHE lead in school, to document our existing good practice, as well as a range of other activities including submitting a bid for funding to create ideas for developing employment opportunities for our pupils / students. At the Lancashire Careers Hub Conference on June 20th, Jenny Bayliss was delighted to receive our certificate of recognition in achieving 7 out of the 8 benchmarks, which was presented by Sir John Holman.

#### **RIBBLE REWARDS**

After a great year, Ribble enjoyed an end of year trip to the Cinema and McDonald's. Some students went to watch Toy Story 4 and some saw Aladdin. After the film we travelled to McDonald's on the school minibus and filled up on burgers and milkshakes. All of the students were a great representation of our school. ## NHS ADVICE: MEASLES

Measles outbreaks can happen anywhere and at any time. Since October 2017 measles outbreaks have been reported in Leeds, Liverpool, Birmingham, Manchester and Surrey that are all linked to ongoing large outbreaks in Europe.

Anyone planning to travel to Europe should make sure they are up to date with their MMR vaccines. Unvaccinated people travelling to Romania, Italy and Germany (where there are large outbreaks) are at particularly high risk. Measles is a highly infectious viral illness that can be very unpleasant and can sometimes lead to serious complications.

The MMR vaccine is available to all adults and children who are not up to date with their two doses of MMR vaccine. Anyone who is not sure if they are protected should check with their GP practice.

#### WATER SAFETY

Swim with your friends and family; Friends can go and get help if needed; Never go swimming alone
