

GOOD TIMES WITH TOWNELEY











COLOUR SORTING FUN

Calder have been working super hard on Tuesday mornings during their colour sorting lessons in the hall. They have been working on their engagement steps which incorporate lots of different skills from many areas.

They are given the freedom to explore a different environment to complete an activity. There are lots of new, exciting sensory stimuli, activities and objects which they can engage with, respond to and anticipate more consistently whilst maintaining a focus on certain colours both visually and through music.



Over time we are able to determine what interests each student so they can initiate these to staff in their own forms of communication. Students work on their gross motor skills and physical development, engaging with the whole space and new objects. This could include throwing balls, hula hoops and moving around on boards as well as bouncing on balls to engage their proprioceptive senses. Students use their fine motor skills to explore smaller objects. Music related to the colours is played to link in with their transitions to different colours and tidying up.

OUT IN THE COMMUNITY

Calder have been getting out and about on Monday afternoons this term. We all pile into the minibus and off we go... We fed the ducks in Barrowford Park and had a nice walk. It's always good to get some fresh air and exercise.

We do love a good cafe visit and have been to lots including ASDA, Pendle Heritage Centre and Booths in Barrowford. The students always choose what they want to drink using their communication files. Kyle does love his cup of tea! We had a look around the store at ASDA and Kyle chose some biscuits for snack. Hassan helped to scan and pay. Abdullah thought the chocolate aisle was great and wanted one of everything. At the Heritage Centre we all chose what we would like to drink and also enjoyed a homemade Raspberry Bun. When we visited Booth's we made our choices again; Hassan likes a cup of black tea and Maryam loves her juice. We also had some chocolate brownie and millionaires shortbread.

KS4 students have completed an AQA unit award on Environmental awareness; Identifying items that can be recycled, producing a poster showing why we need to recycle and identified some human behaviour that is harmful to the environment.

Pendle have been working hard in lots of curriculum activities this term. In Maths, students have been working on capacity and volume, measuring different amounts and reading different scales to consolidate their learning. We have also been experiencing working with the green screen, and having fun making our own news round production on Environmental Awareness.

The third snack that they prepared was pancakes. The students' mixed their pancake produce and cooked them in a small pan. They added lemon juice and sugar and some of the students added syrup to flavour the snack when cooked



MARSDEN MAYHEM

As always in Marsden we have had lots of fun whilst learning. We have been going to Marsden Park regularly and we have seen students conquer their fears and show great pride in themselves. They have tried different things and used the iPad to choose their snacks and drinks. A particular favourite is the hot chocolate!

On world book day we took the opportunity to read whilst at the park. It has been a definite highlight and was enjoyed by the whole of the Marsden form!

Marsden have also been using their senses to experience first aid equipment, procedures and show an awareness of the job health care professionals carry out. From role play, bandaging, putting on plasters, experiencing the recovery position, to using syringes and exploring the emergency blankets. Lots of fun (and learning) was had by all.



WHAT HAVE WYRE **BEEN DOING?**

This term Wyre have been learning about the solar system and the human respiratory system. Students made a model of the Solar system and were entertained by trying to place the planets the correct distance apart. We looked at several mnemonics to learn the order of the planets, with some of the students even making up their own.

Our respiratory topic was great fun for the students where they learnt about the heart and lungs, by taking part in activities and seeing how these things changed their heart rate and breathing. We found we have some excellent hula-hooping skills during the exercises to increase our heart rate.

Wyre have also been studying Shakespeare's Richard III. Pupils learnt that a lot of todays phrases were started by Shakespeare; much to their surprise! Our class had a good time using Shakespearian terms especially 'bridle thy tongue'! Pupils had fun acting out a script they had written themselves using the language they had learnt.





WILD-ED CONSERVATION

A group of students have been lucky to have had the opportunity to work with some conservation volunteers, on a Tuesday afternoon, to create eco-friendly bird feeders, plant pots and a bug hotel.

The students loved learning about the conservational work going on in the local area and the volunteers sharing their stories of different encounters with wildlife whilst workina.

Students have also had the opportunity to experience a local banner exhibition, with banners dating back almost 100 hundred years!

The great work already done is expected to be entered into a county wide competition, hosted in Manchester.

PALLET PETS

Students in DT have been enjoying creating their own pet from recycled pallet wood. They first drew out the shapes for a cat or a dog onto wood. They then cut out, sanded and prepared the pieces before glueing them all together. Once built, they enjoyed decorating them with a variety of buttons, bolts, screws, nuts and whatever else they could find. The last task was to name their pet and we had lots of fun with this and had pets named Bernard, Charlie, Casper and Florence to just name just a few. A fun task enjoyed by all!



YARROW GO TO SPACE

Yarrow have been very busy in Science last half term, they have been involved in some great projects whilst learning about Space. The class made wonderful rockets from recycled materials, including cardboard and plastic bottles. They were very proud of their creations and enjoyed showing off their cool designs. Kyle was especially proud, getting his design photographed as he had really worked hard on his rocket.



Yarrow also made models of planet Earth, this was whilst learning about the Earth's different layers. Students also created amazing 3D models using different coloured playdough. Once completed they could cut into the model and reveal the brightly coloured layers of the inner and outer core, the mantle and the crust. This was a great activity for the students to embed what they had been learning about in previous lessons. The models looked fantastic, well done Yarrow!

COMMUNITY SHOP AND CAFÉ

Some of our post-16 students have been getting involved in the establishment of a community shop and café.

This project is inspired by our involvement with the ASDA / FareShare joint venture. In 2013, ASDA entered into an innovative partnership with its fresh food suppliers and FareShare to ensure surplus food benefits charities and community projects across the UK. This offers a simple and practical way for ASDA and its suppliers to turn an environmental problem into a real benefit for communities and as a result, we receive a range of items free of charge.

The aim of our project is to distribute the FareShare goods in our 'shop'. Customers will come to the shop to select for themselves the items they need rather than receiving pre-packed bags, possibly containing items they don't need. Students have been involved in creating a name, designing a logo, branding and producing publicity with our administrative staff.

They have undertaken a variety of roles and tasks, including creating and recording information on stock sheets, practising 'meeting and greeting' skills with each other, making tea and coffee and serving biscuits.

We have made up some food parcels by selecting items from stock and packing up these goods for families in need. In this way, the students have developed a range of skills required for employment, including; working as a team, taking on a particular role or task, being on time and following instructions.

LYTHAM PRACTICE HEALTHY LIVING

This term, the students have been continuing to take part in daily exercise at college to encourage a healthy lifestyle. The students are still doing a brisk walk around the rabbit run every day (rain or shine, but mainly rain!). Some students have the opportunity to use the scooters or bikes, whilst others access the Hydro facilities on a twice-weekly basis.

The students have also all taken part in a different exercise every day, as led and demonstrated by a fellow classmate as part of target work. They have all really enjoyed the variety of exercises this has allowed them to try.

Of course, as well as completing daily exercise, students have been continually encouraged to drink water regularly as an important part of a healthy lifestyle.

In addition to this, we have been showing off our handwashing skills! We have watched lots of videos on the best way to wash our hands and then demonstrated to each other the correct way to do it. This was made more fun by making a video that was put together to show to the rest of college.

Whilst we do have a particular focus on doing this more often at the moment, and it is especially good to remember as part of everyday life, this is not just something for now, but a skill that is a lifelong benefit to help our students stay healthy and something we always encourage everyone to do, especially before preparing or eating food!

WONDERFUL WENNING

Wenning had a special visit from Executive Warrant Officer Watson from Collingwood Naval Base. He told students a story about Admiral Lord Nelson and brought different uniforms for them to try on. He also brought his medals to for them to look at and they all received a HMS Collingwood commemoration coin to mark the 80th anniversary of Collingwood.

Wenning have also been visiting Asda and exploring ICT in the community. They have been using the self-service tills and the drinks dispensers in the café...shh don't tell Mrs Lingard!

For their PSHE lessons this term, Wenning have been working on their road safety skills, using zebra crossings, pelican crossings and learning the green cross code.

They also made a video on how to keep your hands clean, The Clean Hand Rap for the Wenninc class assembly. Lots of great times had by all!

As part of one of our science topics Hodder had to label the main parts of the Body so James volunteered to be drawn around which involved lots of laughs! Hodder then worked together to label as many parts of the Body as they could in a given time.


INSTALLATION INSTRUCTIONS

"On Saturday morning 11th January 2020 I did the Skipton parkrun. The course is a whopping 4 and $\frac{1}{2}$ kilometers and it is a tiring run; I ran the whole way round in 39 minutes and 41 seconds! It is a very good course. The park is called Aireville Park; there is an onsite car park and another car park not far from the park at Morrisons supermarket in Skipton. It is a five-minute walk to get to Aireville park and it is a good a park for young children. On 18th January we had to cancel the parkrun because of the icy weather; whenever we have bad weather (like mentioned above) the parkrun director and officials will put a message out on the Facebook page. Saturday 1st February 2020 was my second parkrun and this week's time was 40 minutes and 3 seconds."





MAN FOR PAKISTAN - SIKANDER

Sikander is our Newshounds 'man for Pakistan' and enjoys researching famous people from that country. In the last issue, he brought us the singer Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan. This time, he's gone slightly further back to the 'founding father' of the nation, Muhammad Ali Jinnah. Nusrat was born just one month after Muhammad died, so it's a good timeline link. Find out about this great historical figure, as Sikander lays his knowledge before you!

Muhammad Ali Jinnah was a lawyer, politician and became the founder of Pakistan, where his birthday is considered a national holiday. He was the country's first Governor-General until his death and he is revered in Pakistan as Quaid-i-Azam (Great Leader) and Baba-i-Qaum (Father of the Nation).

Jinnah was born Mahomedali Jinnahbhai to Jinnahbhai Poonja and his wife Mithibai on 25 December 1876, in a rented apartment on the second floor of Wazir Mansion near Karachi, which is now in Sindh, Pakistan (but was then within British India). Jinnah's family was from a wealthy merchant background; his father was a merchant and came from a family of textile weavers in the village of Paneli; his mother was also from that village and Jinnah was their second child. He had three brothers and three sisters.

Jinnah trained as a barrister at Lincoln's Inn in London. Upon his return to British India, he enrolled at the Bombay High Court and took an interest in national politics, which eventually took over his legal practice. Jinnah rose to prominence in the Indian National Congress in the first two decades of the twentieth century. In these early years of his political career, Jinnah advocated Hindu - Muslim unity and also became a key leader in the All India Home Rule League, where he proposed a reform plan to safeguard the political rights of Muslims in 1920. By 1940, Jinnah had come to believe that Muslims living in the Indian subcontinent should have their own state and in that year the Muslim League, led by Jinnah, passed the Lahore Resolution, which demanded a separate nation. However, the Indian National Congress and the Muslim League could not reach agreement to have power shared within one state and therefore it was agreed to have independence of (i) a predominantly Hindu India and (ii) a Muslim majority state of Pakistan, which was created on 14 August 1947. As the first Governor-General of Pakistan, Jinnah worked hard to aid the millions of Muslim migrants who had emigrated from the new nation of India to Pakistan after independence, personally supervising the establishment of refugee camps.

Jinnah died at the age of 71 on 11 September 1948, just over a year after Pakistan gained independence from the United Kingdom. He left a deep and respected legacy in Pakistan. Streets, roads and localities all over the world are named after him, while several universities and public buildings in Pakistan bear his name. According to his biographer Stanley Wolpert, he remains Pakistan's greatest leader.

LEIGHTON LOOKS IN THE LOCH

Leighton's first article as a Newshound is, quite literally, a monster one! He's been beavering away to find out as much as he can about Nessie, the beast that inhabits the deep waters of Loch Ness in Scotland - or does it? Here are his 'top ten' discoveries judge for yourself!

• The most famous photo of Nessie is this 'head and neck shot', taken in 1934, but is it real or is it fake?



- Stories of Nessie, the Loch Ness Monster, go back as far as the year 565 when someone wrote about Saint Columba seeing 'a beast in the water'.
- In 1933, a big game hunter called Marmaduke Wetherell went to Loch Ness in 1933 in the hope of bagging his most significant kill, but all he found was a suspicious footprint on the shore. A cast of the footprint revealed it was a hoax - possibly by Wetherell himself - made with a hippopotamus foot umbrella stand!
- In 1933, Bertram Mills, a circus owner, promised a sum of £20,000 to anyone who could bring the Monster to his circus alive! That's around £1 million in today's money!
- A recording of a dark object heading towards Fort Augustus in 1960 is classed as 'the greatest piece of evidence for the Loch Ness monster'.
- · Some people believe Nessie is a plesiosaur, which is a type of dinosaur.
- Nessie is the most famous 'cryptid', which is the name for a creature whose existence hasn't been proved yet.
- Celebrities like the writers Gavin Maxwell and Compton Mackenzie have reported sightings of the Loch Ness Monster, while Alex Campbell, a local expert on Loch Ness, has reportedly seen Nessie 16 times!
- The government led by Margaret Thatcher. Britain's first woman Prime Minister, considered the Loch Ness monster to be real and made Nessie a protected species In the 1980s.
- A survey in 2006 found that Nessie was the most famous personality in Scotland!

He's travelled back in time, nearly five hundred years, in fact, to find out all about Queen Elizabeth the First! He surfaces from his researches to bring you the results of his labours in The Queen and I! Discover some really amazing facts about 'Good Queen Bess'!

Following the sudden death of Elizabeth's younger brother, Edward VI, in 1553, no one was guite certain who would succeed him. Both Elizabeth and her elder sister, Mary, each had supporters for their claim to the throne. After Mary, a strident Catholic, ascended to the throne in July 1553, Protestants continually rebelled. Following her father Henry VIII's split from the Roman Catholic Church, Elizabeth was raised as a Protestant and went on to rule as a Protestant Queen after her sister Mary's death, also serving as Supreme Governor of the Church of England



During her reign, Elizabeth introduced a new Book of Common Prayer and had an English translation of the Bible published

English Roman Catholics wanted a Catholic monarch on the throne and many rebellions during Elizabeth's reign were attempts to make the country Catholic again. When support turned to her Catholic cousin Mary, Queen of Scotland, Elizabeth acted to defend herself. After keeping Mary imprisoned

for 19 years, Elizabeth eventually had her cousin executed at Fotheringhay Castle on 8 February 1587

During her reign, Elizabeth undertook twenty-five royal tours throughout England, which helped to endear the Queen to her people. However, Elizabeth refused to ride in a carriage and instead rode on horseback

Elizabeth enjoyed art and literature. Playwrights William Shakespeare and Christopher Marlowe together with composers Thomas Tallis and William Byrd were all entertaining audiences during Elizabeth's reign

Elizabeth gave a rousing speech at Tilbury in 1588, right before her navy set out to fight the Spanish Armada in order to stop an invasion of England. She said: I know I have the body of a



weak and feeble woman, but I have the heart and stomach of a king, and a king of England, too, and think foul scorn that ... any prince of Europe should dare to invade the borders of my realm. ... I myself will be your general, judge, and rewarder of every one of your virtues in the field.

Following this speech, her men destroyed half of the Spanish Armada!

Elizabeth is famously known as the 'Virgin Queen'. Yet in 1566, parliament attempted to force her to marry. Elizabeth refused, declaring that she had married her country and had no intention of marrying a man in the future. The queen was true to her word and never did marry, though rumours circulated about an affair between Elizabeth and Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester

She wore white make up and threw shoes at people when she was cross!

Even though she is remembered as a 'fashion gueen', it's surprising to know just expansive Elizabeth's wardrobe was. According one estimate, she may have owned as many as two thousand pairs of gloves!
