

I hope you enjoy the newsletter and that you all have a very Happy Easter.





Times Tables Rock Stars is becoming increasingly popular with many of our students. It is a carefully sequenced programme providing a fun way of learning multiplication and division. It challenges each individual and allows students to have fun, competing with friends or other classes within school.

Having a better knowledge of times tables will boost confidence and application when solving maths problems. Students enjoy creating their own avatar and rock alter ego. All their efforts are recorded and they can see each week what position they are on the leaderboard. One of our students said, "I really like it. You can play against your friends and even at home."

Students have been working very hard on their times tables this term. As well as learning their times tables off by heart, students are also challenging each other to see who can earn the most coins to buy virtual red noses. The makers of TT Rockstars donate 5p for every red nose purchased.

The Challenge is open to all schools across the country and it is hoped that £5000 will be raised for Red Nose Day! Ms Blyth 'rocked out' providing some much light hearted entertainment to make it fun at the same time as learning.

Flatpack Fun

The Spring Term has been an unusual one this year, with another lockdown meaning not all of our students could be in school.

Remote learning created a challenge for D.T. to create practical activities for the learners to enjoy and build in their home. We started with the concept of designing something that could be assembled without tools, fixings, or adhesive and yet still be fun and offer a level of challenge to the students. These projects also had to fit in an a4 envelope and be flat packed so they could be posted home... it was quite the task! But, there's nothing we enjoy more than a challenge in D.T.

Next we made solar systems in the form of hanging mobiles. Students were asked to research each planet then decorate them to reflect their colour and texture ready to be displayed.

All the students that have been involved in the D.T. lessons, both in school and at home, have thoroughly enjoyed having something practical to enjoy during this lockdown period. 


BOWLAND

It was great to see so many of our students accessing learning remotely during this latest lockdown. Let's see what some of them have been getting up to.





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































Every Move Counts

Students were able to access a virtual tour of Asda in Warrington to look at the different jobs within the store ranging from administration roles to working in the warehouse. Students also explored a range of smelly roles from maggot farming to cleaning portaloos.

Everyone continued to build on their previous learning developing their CVs to support them in the future. Feedback from students was that they really enjoyed working together in teams and exploring a range of jobs that they may look towards gaining meaningful employment from in the future.

Joyful Geography

Years 8 and 9 have been learning about natural and man made resources. Fieldwork was conducted around the school grounds with students identifying natural resources and taking photos using their iPads. Some students even produced fantastic dioramas.
