

HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS: RESPECT



At PCHS we care for and respect ourselves, other people, our environment and always try our best. Wyre pupils have been doing some focused work with Miss Bayliss on Healthy Relationships, focusing on respect.

Pupils explored what it means to care for and respect ourselves; thinking about ways to take care of our physical, mental, social, spiritual and emotional health, such as personal care, good sleep and taking part in social activities.

They explored how we can care for and respect other people; thinking about being polite and courteous, treating others in a way we want to be treated, helping others, being kind and treating adults how we would want our family to be treated at work.

The pupils considered how we care for and respect our environment; pupils were able to talk about taking care of school equipment, helping by tidying up their mess, recycling and putting litter in the bin.

Pupils thought carefully about always trying our best; not giving up, trying to do things better or differently, and that excellence is not being the best but doing your best.



OUTDOOR EDUCATION: SCIENCE

During Ribble's outdoor science lesson we explored the life cycle of a plant. We went into the sensory garden and looked at the different parts of a plant, the stem, the leaves, the roots and the flower. We looked at the different seeds and their shapes and sizes. We got nice and muddy digging in the soil to see what seeds, creepy crawlies and other things we could find buried within the soil. We then planted 5000 of our own seeds and are watching them grow in class, with each student having the responsibility of watering the seeds once a day.







On 9th July 2021, Pendle Community High School and College were proud to be awarded the 360 degree Online Safety Mark. The 360-degree safe tool is an award winning online safety self-review tool for schools. We have been using the self-assessment tool for several years to develop our online safety policy and practice at PCHSC.

It was a rigourous process to gather all of our evidence to show how we are meeting all of the criteria in order to gain this mark. The first step towards gaining the mark was to complete an online application to South West Grid for Learning and submission of a completed 360 degree safe self review. We also had to provide a full commentary for each aspect which fully described our provision for that aspect and how it met the required benchmark level.

Following the application, the assessor checked the completed safe self-review tool to ensure that our school appeared (in our responses) to have met the benchmark levels and were ready for an assessor visit.

Our school then welcomed an assessor in (remotely due to restrictions) on the 9th July. We agreed an agenda for the visit and the assessor met with a range of staff, students/pupils, parents/carers and governors to discuss the different areas. The assessor also carried out a brief review of some of the school's paper/online evidence (policies, minutes, audit logs etc). At the end of the visit we were informed by the assessor that our application had been successful! Well done to everyone involved.

IRWELL & YARROW VISIT THE FOREST

Irwell and Yarrow had a fantastic time at Marsden Park Forest School. They explored the surroundings, made mud pies, made a tree swing, and relaxed in hammocks. The session was then finished off with a drink and a biscuit. They all loved being in the great outdoors.

Marsden have been working towards gaining a British Values AQA. One of the things they had to achieve is to take part in a charitable event. We decided as a class to take on the challenge of walking around the nature trail 100 times in a week. We set ourselves the target of raising £50. THIS IS NOT FAKE NEWS...

Following the success of Safer Internet Day, Childnet International set up a film competition asking young people to create a short film or storyboard exploring the theme of: Separating fact from fiction - finding trustworthy information online. The Safer Internet Day research found that more than three quarters of young people say being online is a more important part of their life than ever before. However, almost half are seeing misleading content online every day. The film has to be based on the following key themes:

- What can you do to find out whether something online is true or not?
- Why would someone post something online that isn't true?
- How would we help someone to understand the difference between fact and fiction?

Various groups within school and college worked hard to create their videos. The competion received over 100 entries and students in Bowland managed to make it into the top 5 in the secondary age category! The video 'Is it fake or is it real?' BLACKO VISIT FOREST SCHOOL


This was Blacko's first excursion to Forest Schools. We headed out toward Barley at the foot of Pendle Hill. We were hidden beneath a canopy of woodland, with a mixture of conifer and broadleafed trees, some that were rather ancient.

Nayab attempted to estimate the height of a Larch tree; he thought about 90 foot. Some of our students remembered how to tell the age of a tree by counting the annual rings.

Under the guidance of the Forest School Leader, they were encouraged to have a closer look at the common stinging nettle. Not only does it host a wide variety of insects but it also has some medicinal properties too. They were shown how to handle them safely and later they were asked if they would like to try some nettle tea.

We then played some games which gave us more time to witness the woodland environment. Some decided they would like to try a little relaxation within the comfort of a hammock. Meanwhile Liam and Daniel tried to build a woodland shelter out of canvas and ropes.

We then lit a campfire and toasted some bread whilst trying the delights of some home made nettle tea. The students really enjoyed their woodland experience and can't wait for another visit in such salubrious surroundings.

WONDERFUL WYRE



BIKEABILITY

In the Summer term students had a chance to get on their bikes and ride! The Go Velo team came in for two weeks in June and worked with our young people to improve skills and confidence. The groups varied from complete beginners, who successfully achieved a 'Learning to Ride' certificate, through to level two, who were practising skills you would need to ride safely on the roads. Emma the tutor was impressed by the students' determination to improve their skills and she will be back in September to run some more courses.







FUN AT FOREST SCHOOL

During the Summer term we have been able to set up and participate in our Forest School programme. Some classes have had their sessions on school grounds and some have been up to Boothman Park, where we are lucky enough to have access to a beautiful Beech woodland. It's situated on top of a hill, where you can see the stunning views of Pendle Hill through the gaps in the trees. We've also been fortunate to have had beautiful weather most days which has only added to the magic!

So far this term, classes have had a few Forest School taster sessions where they have begun to explore and become acquainted with nature. We have had a fabulous time playing games, drinking hot chocolate, swinging in the hammocks, listening to stories, creating nature art, finding animals, roasting snacks on the fire, making mud face paint and much more.



HOW TO BE A LION IN HODDER

In the Summer term Hodder have been reading the book 'The Butterfly Lion' by Michael Morpurgo. Students in Hodder took turns in reading parts of the book and completing different activities based on it.
