Let me begin by sharing my appreciation and thanking parents/ carers, governors and the staff team for your support and contributions in what has been an extremely busy term. There have been lots of activities, both new and old, being back on offer in the curriculum. We had the ever-popular MacMillan coffee and cake event, Mental Health awareness day, Pendle Dogs in

Need assembly, Remembrance Day with Pendle Vale, Anti-bullying week, Children in Need and we managed a scaled down version for the Leavers' presentation assembly and other activities that you can read about in this newsletter. CASHLESS SCHOOL

Due to a number of factors including the Covid-19 pandemic and the closure of a number of local banks; in the new year we will be working towards becoming a cash free school. We will be asking all parents/carers to sign up to our ParentPay system and will no longer accept cash payments sent into school. We have been using the system since September and it is working very well for the 66% of our parents/carers who are already using it.

ParentPay offers you the freedom to make payments whenever and wherever you like, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, safe in the knowledge that the technology used has the highest internet security available.

You will have a secure online account, activated using a unique username and password. All information has been sent out already but we will send it again in the new year. If you have more than one child at our school, or children at other ParentPay schools, you can create a single account login for all your children.

Making a payment is straightforward and ParentPay holds a payment history for you to view at a later date; no card details are stored in any part of the system. Once you have activated your account you can make online payments straight away.

Online payments will be available for school dinners, uniform, trips and events, clubs, even for donations for fundraising events.

We hope you will support us in achieving our goal to become a cashless school. Your support in using ParentPay will help the school enormously. Thank you.



CHRISTMAS MARKET

On 7th December we held our Christmas Market event. This year we wanted to give the look and feel of a real Christmas Market and the students worked incredibly hard to make this happen. We received some funding from Bright Sparks to create the actual market stalls themselves. During their DT lessons the students used a whole range of skills to create 20 individual stalls. They helped to prepare the wood by sanding it and making sure all pieces were the correct length. They fixed frames together and attached them to tables. They then had to troubleshoot ways to make the stalls sturdy and ensure they wouldn't fall over. Lots of students got involved with the painting and everyone had lots of fun while listening to Christmas music, it was a real Christmas workshop! Once all the stalls were ready, they were wheeled into place and dressed up ready for our stallholders to set up with their wares. We had quite the range including handmade jewellery, resin gifts, pin badges and music memorabilia, tropic skincare, personalised gifts, candles, wax melts and salt crystals, bath bombs and books.

The Grotto definitely stole the show this year with Santa sitting on his custom made sleigh. Students in DT helped create the magnificent item from an old car that had been used in a drama performance! Our college students made a tremendous effort to prepare the tombola and raffle ready for the event. All students showed incredible employability skills including teamwork, communication and the ability to work on a production line.

The event was a success and raised £1134.99 for We CAN Charitable Trust. Well done to everyone involved and thank you to everyone who came and supported our event.














BIG LITTLE VOICES






INTO FILM FESTIVAL








RE THEMES
