

MENTAL HEALTH

MENTORS

This term, Ifras, Nabil, Asad and Callum have been doing Mental Health Mentor training from the Anna Freud centre. The training has taught them to understand what a peer mentor is and how they can support other children, understanding that building a relationship is central to being a good peer mentor. They have also been learning what active listening is and have been practising it.

The training focuses on how a Peer Mentor can act as a helping hand, a listener and someone who can support another child with making positive changes. This support includes encouragement, and information to the children they are supporting.

The training has been teaching them to try to understand things from the viewpoint of the pupil they are supporting. They have also been learning skills which will help them support other pupils to make a positive change in their life and not about telling the pupil what to do.

The Mental Health Mentors have been learning how to: understand the pupil's current problem, why the pupil wants to change it, thinking of what some of the options are to make a change and who might be able help the pupil to make this change.

The Peer Mentors have been learning to understand when they need to keep something private and when they need to inform an adult. The training will be completed next term and they will plan with Jenny how to begin their work from the ideas they have come up with.





EXPLORING FAITH

In RE this term, students in year 7 have been exploring the Islamic faith. We have looked at celebrations and rites of passage, the journey to Mecca and the features of a Mosque.

Years 8 and 9 have been focusing on Pilgrimages and the special journeys people take in their faith. We have discussed Christianity, Judaism, Islam and Buddhism.

BUSY IN BLACKO


It's been quite the busy term down in Blacko; it's fair to say that they've made a lot of progress in all areas!

GARDENING FOR ALL WITH THE HELP OF DT

This term, Pendle Community High School & College were successful in securing grant funding from Pendle Council Climate Action Small Grants scheme, in order to build a raised bed to make gardening activities in the sensory garden more accessible to students in wheelchairs.

Having incorporated the project into their DT lessons, students were tasked with designing and building a raised bed that students in wheelchairs could easily access to carry out planting activities with the rest of their class.

Once a design was agreed upon and all of the materials had been ordered and delivered, students began to build the item in place in the sensory garden. The project was a huge success and students were able to develop a variety of skills such as communication, measuring, tool skills, motor skills and problem solving amongst others. The students and staff in the DT department really enjoyed having a big build project to get stuck into.

After a few design adjustments, the finished raised bed looks great and is ready to be planted up!







RIBBLE IN SPACE

Ribble have had lots of fun learning this half term! We have been studying Space. As part of our topic, we visited the Liverpool Museum and visited the Planetarium. Students learnt lots about all the different planets and watched a planet show telling the story of a newly formed star and how he finds out about other types of stars and his own family of planets. All the students had a fantastic time!

FANTASY FUN IN IRWELL

As part of this term's topic, 'Fantasy' Irwell pupils visited the pirate themed park at crow wood hotel. Pupils reenacted the story, 'The Night Pirates' before exploring all what the park had to offer.



MARSDEN EXPLORE HABITATS

One of the topics Marsden have been learning about this term is insects and their habitats. The students dug in some soil and observed the worms in their habitat. They then collected some worms and made a new habitat for them, adding layers of soil and coloured

gravel, water, and food.

Some of the students found out that during the day earthworms mostly stay in their burrows underground and at night they come up near or on to the surface to feed. If the air it is too cold or too dry, they stay down in the soil. Other students played matching games on the interactive board, as well as completing jigsaws that they made in their DT lessons.

On Tuesday 15th March Dr Neill Crane (Geologist) came to school and did workshops with KS3 & KS4 coving the different types of rocks, fossils and crystals.







TREE PLANTING



This term, students in college took part in tree planting at Sabden with the Pendle Hill HLF Project.

Students and staff were given cards explaining which trees were which, so they were able to identify them.

They took part in tree measuring activities, as well as activities to understand the age of the trees.




COMPUTING AND ICT

THE BIG BATTERY HUNT

Each student will be coming home with a battery collection box as part of the Big Battery Hunt.
