Wenning also went on a trip to Blackpool Zoo. They enjoyed getting to see a range of different animals around the park, including elephants, gorillas, giraffes, kangaroos – just to name a few; and getting to watch the sea lion show. The students were less keen on the peacocks and seagulls.

This half term we have been working on Castles, Battles and Knights. Students have enjoyed looking at the armour of knights, threading to make their own chainmail, using stepping stones to cross the moat around the castle and learning about battling dragons with the story 'Zog'. What a fabulous way to end an exciting year in Wonderful Wenning!



### WILD ED QUESTION TIME

What a fabulous year working with Action for Conservation! We have learned about biodiversity, climate crisis, plastic crisis and deforestation. Students in Bowland have also had the opportunity to talk with Andrew Stephenson, our local MP. We discussed with Andrew the issues that Lytham and Bowland have raised with AfC over the school year:

- We would like to have more bins and recycling facilities in our local community.
- We would like the opportunity for every child to plant a sapling, shrub/bush or scatter wild flower seeds when they start their education.
- We would like to see a ban on single use plastics in all Pendle schools.
- We would like to have alternative power in our schools and college such as solar power.

Andrew agreed that schools and colleges could do more in the Pendle area to reduce litter. He said it is up to us to spread the word to explain why it is so important and how we can all do our bit to recycle, reuse and reduce waste, by telling our brothers, sisters and parents and our wider family to really think about being eco-friendly.

Andrew reminded the group that The Queen's Green Canopy is an initiative that began in May 2021 in the United Kingdom in honour of the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II in 2022. To increase and protect the native tree cover, people are being urged to create this 'special gift' for the Queen, to mark her 70 years on the throne. They have enlisted the help from the Bee group and the Woodland trust but are struggling for volunteers to plant saplings. Students immediately said they would love to help.

Andrew told us that 9 acres of land has been allocated for planting on rather than for planning permission which was comforting to the group. He also talked about the new deposit return scheme that shops will be running where we will all pay a little bit more for a bottle of pop but will get some money back when we return it to the shop. There is also a scheme for decarbonising buildings where local councils will be able to apply for a grant to purchase solar panels, wind and water powered energy.





#### **COFFEE MORNING**



On Friday 24th June, we had another well attended coffee morning at Hodge House Community Centre with Alison McConville, FLO, Amy Mckay, School Nurse and Paul Hartley who ran an enjoyable talkaoke session with parents and the Lytham students. We all had a go talking on the microphone about our chosen subjects including well-being, the prom and ways in which parents can support our PCHSC community. The Lytham students were the perfect hosts serving refreshments to the parents.

#### **ECO GROUP COMBAT CLIMATE CHANGE**

The 14-16 Eco Group are passionate about PCHS doing its bit to help combat climate change and becoming as environmentally friendly as possible.

The main cause of frustration and despair in school at the moment is the use of single plastic cups in the refectory at lunch time. The group's suggestion is that pupils should bring in their own reusable cup or bottle and take it down to the refectory with them instead of throwing away lots of plastic cups which will just go straight to landfill. If you want to help us, please ensure your child has a reusable cup or bottle that can be brought to school and used at breaks and lunchtimes. The environment will thank you!

The Eco Group are passionate about spreading the word to the whole school about ways in which we can do more to stop climate change, such as turning off lights when there is no one in a room; switching off computers and whiteboards when not in use; recycling used pens, scrap paper and batteries and buying reusable shopping bags instead of purchasing more and more plastic carriers at every shopping trip.

The group have been very happy when members of staff have been inspired by them to think about their actions and the impact they are having on the planet. For example, Mr Taj has stopped buying small bottles of water and invested in a smart reusable water bottle which he now drinks out of with pride. Ms Rothwell learnt about how badly cows are treated in order for humans to drink their milk, as well as the impact cows have on our environment and she now drinks plant based alternatives such as oat milk or almond milk. Yum!

The Eco group were shocked to discover that meat served up in fast food chains is one of the main causes of man's destruction of the rainforest: no one could quite believe that the equivalent of ten football pitches were destroyed every minute in 2021 just to provide the world with cheap meat. Mrs Flanagan has stopped eating meat partly in response to this shocking figure and she hopes that others will also cut down on their consumption of meat to help protect the rainforests which are 'the lungs of our earth.'

What can you and your family do to help our mission to be an eco-aware school? We would love it if this short article has inspired you in even the smallest of ways to become more environmentally friendly.

#### **READY, STEADY, CHANGE**





It was an excellent evening enjoyed by all and lots of memories were made. Well done to the college council for all of the planning, organising and making the night happen.
























### The D to the A to the NT news


Today we had a real treat when we had not 1 not 2 but 7 teams who went into this year's sweet stack tower commotion who will come out on top and who will be left to clean up.
