SCIENCE IN SLAIDBURN

It has been a pleasure teaching in Slaidburn this year. The students have worked so hard and have made amazing progress.

This term we looked at Tim Peake, the first British astronaut to walk in space. We read two stories and then made some props to retell our own story. It was fun making the props.

In Science, we have been exploring rocks. We learned about where they come from and we went around school to see where and how they are used. We also found out whether the rocks floated or sank when we dropped them in water.

In Geography, we created our own volcano and watched it erupt. We did this by adding vinegar to bicarbonate of soda and washing up liquid. It was cool!



SPOOKY IN HODDER

This term in Hodder we have been getting all spooky within our topic in English based on the play Macbeth. We started with an introduction to Shakespearean language and the characters of the witches. We had lots of fun coming up with adjectives to describe witches which we then used when we had a go at writing our own wonderfully witchy poem focussing on creative vocabulary, rhyme and alliteration! To finish, each student performed their poem to the rest of the class.

A TRIP TO SUNNY SPAIN

On Sunday 14th May as part of our Erasmus project, Every Move Counts, eight KS3 students and four staff members travelled to Tapia De Casariego in Spain. After one flight from Manchester to Barcelona and then another flight from Barcelona to Oviedo we had just an hour-long journey by coach to the school.

The school was a lovely building which had previously been used as a hospital. Tapia itself is a beautiful fishing town which is famous for its surfing!

The first day involved presentations of our school and then a tour around the local area. Whilst in Tapia we had a day trip to Taramundi where we visited a local 'lagar' factory which produces its own cider. The students also participated in an art workshop, a cooking workshop and a coding workshop. We also had a trip to A Coruna where we visited an interactive science museum, Hercules tower and an aquarium.

The final day had us on the beach where we watched a surfing exhibition by one of the students from the school who has already won several national and international championships at only 15 years old!

Pendle Community High School and College

The weather was kind to me earlier and we benefited from a brief respite from the rain when I visited Pendle Community College in my capacity as the former chairman of the Pendle Council Climate Emergency Working Group.

We awarded this Gardening Club £1,500 so that they could design and build some bespoke, accessible raised beds. These are both smart and practical and were entirely completed within Design and Technology lessons.

As you can see from the photo, today was potato harvesting day! As this is their first season, they confessed they have had a few plant casualties – happens to the best of us! Despite watering by the pupils, it sometimes hasn't been enough, so next season they are going to rethink the irrigation. I advised them to get in touch with Trawden Forest Primary whom I visited last week, as they have a very clever system.

After term has ended, they plan to add loads of fresh organic matter and start planning for next year. Then they told me that these raised beds, which do so much to brighten a dreary courtyard, are really mere testbeds for a much bigger project...

Mrs Thompson will have her work cut out with the fundraising, but the College is planning to take over Williams Hall on Barkerhouse Road and run it as a community café, with produce for the café grown in the grounds! This ambitious project will give the pupils really worthwhile experiences and the team looked palpably excited, as well they might. They promised to invite me back to see it all. Not for the first time, this Community Grant Scheme has planted a seed and it has blossomed into something much bigger.

OUR TRIP TO CALVERT TRUST

This term a group of 7 students had the opportunity to attend a five day long residential in the Lake District at the Calvert Trust. Students experienced climbing, abseiling, zip lining, cycling, swimming, canoeing and also spent time in the sensory room. Everyone had an incredible time. On their return, staff commented that being able to witness students achieving things they never believed they could was the most amazing part of the week.





AFTERNOON TEA

Students who are working towards their Level 1 and Level 2 NCFE Food and Cookery Skills worked hard to produce an Afternoon Tea buffet as part of a celebration event remembering Jenny Bayliss.

Students decided what to create, including Kit Kat cheesecake, scones and cheese and tomato quiche. Students also worked as a team to not only have the food ready on time, but to set up the room to serve the buffet with tea, coffee and orange juice and then serve the food to guests.

The Afternoon Tea was another demonstration of the level of food preparation skills our catering students have, how they can work as part of a team and how they can work under pressure to produce food to a good standard.



ALICE IN WONDERLAND

After a full year of gentle preparation, a cast of actors, singers and stage crew managed to pull off two successful preformances of Alice in Wonderland.

We had lots of support from throughout school, including the DT department, who made all of the set including the impressive White Rabbit's house. We also had staff members doing bit part roles, tweedle do and tweedle don't being a big hit with the audience!

The highlights of the production seem as random as the story itself... a pack of cards chaos dancing to Ace of Spades by ACDC; a wacky white rabbit who we were unable to successfully photograph as he moved so fast across the stage; some crazy hedgehogs on scooters being whacked by inflatable flamingos and a blue caterpillar blowing bubbles through a saxophone.

There were too many stand out parts to name and everyone performed to the very best of their ability. We included sections that had been pre recorded and this meant that almost every student in school took part in some form.

Parents, carers, staff, students and governors were all in attendance over the two days and the feedback received was fantastic. Well done to everyone involved!

Students in Key Stage 4 had a great week exploring various careers. We were lucky to welcome two engineers Kristian and Jess, a plumber who designs aircraft for Airbus.

Both set tasks for our students based on aircraft design as well as creating a marble run using only cardboard, tubes and tape. Over the course of the week, students discovered ways to create electricity using citrus fruits and clean water as well as using items found around homes. They then became photographers taking pictures in the school environment.

We were also fortunate to have Lara, the CEO of Oddies, share all the different roles within the local bakery and Mr Edwards, a retired PCSO.

All the students enjoyed the week, getting the chance to explore roles such as engineers, builders, designers and assembly line workers; amongst many other roles. They had lots of fun developing their skills and qualities and finding out what employers are looking for in their workforces.

ARK BARN

As part of their 14- 19 lessons, students visited Ark Barn Education Centre, where they learnt how to care for various animals and made feed for goats, horses and donkeys. Some of the highlights include taking Rolo the alpaca for a walk and collecting the eggs from the hens.

We have covered lots of different topics this term in our Geography lessons from discovering our new school and exploring the local community to looking at the world around us and the weather! This involved making sensory bottles and finding the equator on a globe. We have sat in wonder and watched a birds eye view of flying over a tropical rainforest. We have also experienced the habitats on and around a river bed. Some students even prepared themselves a survival back pack in case of a disaster and discovered what they needed to survive - which didn't include an xbox!






RELIGIOUS EDUCATION
